



## Marvin Bailey Justice

REHOBOTH BEACH- Marvin B. Justice, 78, of Rehoboth Beach, and formerly of Salisbury, went home to be with his Lord and Savior on Sunday, November 13, 2016 at Beebe Medical Center in Lewes.

He was born December 31, 1937 in Horntown, Virginia, a son of the late Spencer D. and Elizabeth Bailey Justice. In addition to his parents, Marvin was preceded in death by brothers, Harvey, Milton, Otho and Roland Justice; and a sister, Lois Faircloth.

Marvin's true loves were his family and his church. He was a long time active member of the First Baptist Church of Delmar where he served several terms as a deacon. Since moving to Rehoboth Beach about 6 years ago, he was a member of the First Baptist Church of Lewes. He loved both of his church families and enjoyed doing what he could at both churches. For 50 years he studied Prophecy and loved to talk to family and friends and even lead seminars on the Prophecies.
